




Care for your feet day by day...



Look at your feet.




Wash with soap and water.

Do not put it between your toes.




File nails straight across.



Throw away razor blades, knives and corn removers.




Wear socks to keep your feet warm...

Clean out your shoes before you put them on.




Wear shoes! Wear shoes that fit.
